Jessica brings a deep love of the Uniting Church in Australia combined with professional experience working with community service organisations.



## Synod calls for drug reform policy

At the November 2023 meeting of Synod, Uniting Vic.Tas brought forward a proposal calling for a health-based approach to reduce the harm of illicit drugs.



Synod heard from Uniting Vic.Tas Alcohol and other Drugs professionals, who brought expert knowledge to this issue from over 50 years delivering specialist Alcohol and other Drug (AOD) treatment services.

Over 250 Synod members, representatives from across the community, participated in workshops and open discussions on the enormous harm to individuals, families and communities that substance abuse may cause.

The Church discourages use of illicit drugs whilst recognising the complex interplay between psychosocial, developmental and environmental factors that can lead to drug dependency and contribute to drug-related harm.

After discussion, deliberation and discernment across two days, the Synod resolved to adopt Uniting's proposal and call upon the Victorian and Tasmanian Governments to:

- Ensure drug policies are based in health and social responses with an aim to increase safety and wellness, while reducing criminalisation, stigmatisation and marginalisation
- Provide greater funding in demand reduction and harm reduction strategies to support people who use drugs and address harm to families and communities
- Decriminalise the possession and personal use of small amounts of illicit drugs.

The resolution is a demonstration of the Church's ongoing commitment to socially just approaches to supporting people facing vulnerability and builds upon Uniting's long history of advocacy in this space.

### Addressing the need for community housing in Bendigo

Planning approval has been granted to Uniting Vic.Tas for its community housing development, worth more than \$44 million, on the St Andrew's Church site in central Bendigo.



The St Andrew's site development will comprise of 73 new one- and two-bedroom units close to a range of services and amenities.

The congregation has been a part of the Bendigo community since 1854. Since their 150th anniversary in 2004, St Andrews has been trying to find a way to give back to their community.

Currently there are around 3000 people across Bendigo who are waiting for community housing and a safe and secure place to call home.

We hope this development will help to fill this need by providing a large number of high-quality, modern, architecturally designed units.
