60 years of hope

Celebrating Lifeline.

Lifeline was established just over 60 years ago by one of the founding agencies of the Uniting Church.

Concerned by the increasing phone calls from people in distress, Wesley Mission's then Superintendent, Rev Sir Alan Walker, founded a 24/7 telephone crisis support service, and called it Lifeline.

"From a desperate call, the tragedy of suicide and a helplessness that was felt by many... the amazing work of Lifeline was born," said Rev Sir Alan Walker.

Now with 41 centres across Australia, Lifeline has saved countless lives and steadfastly maintained its commitment to supporting people in crisis. Uniting's Lifeline Melbourne and Ballarat centres answer more than 44,900 calls a year.

Since opening in 1963, (pictured) compassionate volunteers, many of which come from our Uniting congregations, have been the foundation of the service and been there for people in their darkest moments.

Pilot program born from partnership

The Catalyst Program supports those living with alcohol and other drug dependency.



Catalyst is a five-week rehabilitation program for people looking for support to stop or take a break from substance use following withdrawal support.

Since its commencement in Victoria, over twelve years ago, the program has supported over 1000 people to develop motivation and resilience to cut down their use of alcohol and other drugs and improve their health and wellbeing.

The program consists of a range of activities that build skills and strategies for coping with challenging situations, developing routines and maintaining motivation using Motivational Enhancement Therapy (MET) and Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT).

For the first time, Uniting is piloting this program in Tasmania. Thanks to the generous support of the North Hobart congregation, Uniting is able to run the program out of its property. This partnership allows us to expand Uniting's services in Tasmania so we can reach more people in our communities.
